Board Member Vacancy

Two (2) five (5) -year term vacancies are open to fill the expired terms of office of Mrs. Mary Weimer and Mr. Lyman Lyon. All vacancies are filled “at large.” The candidate with the most number of votes will be elected to the board.

Voter Qualifications

A resident of the Scio Central School District shall be entitled to vote, who is:

1. a citizen of the United States;
2. at least 18 years of age by 5/21/2019;
3. a resident of the district for at least 30 days preceding the vote.

Absentee Ballots

A resident of the Scio Central School District shall be entitled an absentee ballot, who is:

1. A qualified voter of the district;
2. A patient in a hospital or unable to appear personally at the polling place on the day of the vote due to illness or physical disability;
3. Unable to appear because of duties, occupation, business or studies that require him/her to be outside the county or city of residence on the day of the vote.

Obtaining an Absentee Ballot

A qualified voter of the SCS District voting by absentee ballot must:

1. Contact the school by phone or mail and request an application be sent to them;
2. Complete the application and return it to the District; the District Clerk must receive this application at least seven (7) days before the election, if the ballot is to be mailed to the voter; or the day before the election, if the ballot is to be delivered personally to the voter.
3. Complete the ballot, fold it and enclose it in a specially marked envelope, seal it, sign and date the oath;
4. Place the official ballot envelope in another envelope and mail it to the District Clerk, and it must be received no later than 5:00 p.m. on the day of the election.



Proposition 2 -- Purchase of One School Bus

Shall the Board of Education of the Scio Central School District, Allegany County, New York, be authorized to purchase one 64-passenger diesel school bus, at a total purchase price not to exceed one hundred twenty thousand eight hundred ten dollars (\$120,810), less any trade-in allowance, the balance to be financed by bonding over five (5) years, and to levy the necessary taxes?

Proposition 3 – Scio Memorial Library

Shall the Board of Education of the Scio Central School District, Allegany County, New York, be permitted to increase the tax levy for the Scio Memorial Library from \$24,000 to \$24,700?

Election of Two Candidates to the Board of Education

Vote for two (2) five (5)-year term to expire 6/30/24. All vacancies are filled “at large.” The candidate with the most number of votes will be elected to the board.

Proposition 1 -- General Budget

Shall the Board of Education of the Scio Central School District, Allegany County, New York, be authorized to expend the sum set forth in the proposed 2019-2020 budget in the amount of \$10,778,279?



A Message Regarding Our 2019-2020 District Budget

We have worked diligently to prepare a budget for the 2019-2020 school year which will support student programming and is fiscally responsible to the taxpayers in the District. Changes in the budget include:

- A plan for the replacement/repair of musical instruments;
- A plan for the maintenance of science equipment such as proper care of microscopes;
- Funding to have the Business Official position returned to the District as a full-time position; this cost will be off-set by removing our part-time payroll position through BOCES;
- 2-day a week curriculum coordinator through BOCES; we eliminated the full-time position in the fall with plans to implement a part-time replacement;
- 3-day a week social worker from BOCES to assist in meeting needs of our students and support home/school communications;
- Support for newer programs such as VEX robotics.

The proposed tax levy increase is 1.98%, which is below our permissible tax cap increase of 2.11%. To learn more you are welcome to attend our upcoming **budget hearing at 6:30 p.m. on Wednesday, May 8, 2019 in the gymnasium**. 


Proposed 2019-2020 Revenue Distribution





Business Department Update

Thomas Jefferson is reported to have said, "I am a great believer in luck, and I find that the harder I work the more I have of it." When it comes to students signing up to take electives like business classes, they are making more work for themselves, but one would hope it pays off in creating more good luck.

Applied Communications is a full-year course utilizing the Microsoft Office Suite. Students have just finished a slideshow that details Walt Disney's amazing vision and passion for business, created an internet safety show and presented it to the seventh graders, designed club patches for each club in the school, created their own websites and logos, and finished up a spreadsheet that outlined an imaginary business plan. They are also studying *How to Win Friends and Influence People* by Dale Carnegie -- a course based on the best-selling book, which is offered nationwide to adults hoping to improve their human relation skills.

Students in **College Business 1500** -- which is valued at three Jamestown Community College (JCC) College Connections

credits -- are taking notes on their computers about how economics, politics and finance all meet and affect the business world. Students do case studies of influential business role models and try to "see around the corner to the future."

College Accounting and Accounting students are working on payroll, general ledgers and tax forms. Students like Accounting because as with most business classes, it has real world applications.

Marketing students are currently analyzing Shark Tank episodes determining demographics and market potential for new products.

Introduction to Business seventh grade students are learning notetaking, business etiquette, character education and improving communications skills while learning Microsoft Office software.

Microsoft Office eighth grade students are currently learning leadership, team building, finance, and management while keying 40 words per minute or more by course end into their classroom notes.

Our Future Business Leaders of America (FBLA) club is planning to attend another movie in Wellsville, which provides great

common ground for conversation among members.

Most business students are involved in the Stock Market, learning how to invest with \$100,000 imaginary money complete with commission charges and buying long or short.

FBLA President Cameron Kelsey is finishing the redesign of the FBLA hoodie. All students are also welcome to purchase a school letter jacket by seeing Mr. Childs. The quilted jackets with leather sleeves are quite nice, and while most schools only allow athletes to purchase school jackets, SCS is unique in this regard. FBLA Past President Seth Porter believed we should recognize academics by allowing a school letter to be used for academics, athletics, or both. SCS students can earn an academic letter by being on honor roll four quarters in a row during high school. SCS students can also opt to have club patches sewn on the sleeves; such as an FBLA patch.

Students who sign up for electives, rather than taking a light schedule, are indeed creating more work for themselves, but they are also providing an opportunity to grow their skill set and create more "good luck."




