We are off to a great start to the 2023-2024 school year. As with every school year, the safety and well-being of our students and staff are paramount. We are dedicated to

Comprehensive Training: Our teachers and staff undergo safety training programs regularly. This training includes emergency response protocols, preventative measures to secure the building, situational awareness, mental health, and crisis management. Specialized staff such as food service and transportation undergo training specific to their unique situations.

Regular Drills: To ensure that our safety procedures are second nature, we conduct various drills throughout the year. These drills cover evacuation (fire drills), shelter-in-place, and lockdown scenarios. Practicing these procedures helps us minimize panic and maximize safety in real emergencies.

School Security Officer: We are thrilled to announce the Board of Education has approved the addition of a School Security Officer. We are in the midst of the hiring process and hope to communicate to you in November, the successful

candidate. They will work closely with staff, students, and local authorities to enhance our security measures.

We ask that Scio Families partner with us as well. We encourage open and honest communication with our students. parents, and staff members. If you ever have concerns or suggestions regarding safety, please don't hesitate to reach out to us. Parents can play a crucial role in maintaining a safe school environment by reminding their students to:

- Always follow safety protocols: Encourage your child to listen attentively during safety drills and take them seriously. Remind them to understand the importance of following safety guidelines.
- **Report any concerns:** Teach your child to report any suspicious activity or potential safety concerns to a teacher, school staff member, or the School Security Officer. We all have a role in keeping our school safe.
- Stay Informed: Stay updated on school announcements and safety measures. Regularly review safety procedures with your child to ensure they are aware and prepared.

We want to reassure you that we take the safety of our school community very seriously. By staying dedicated to preparedness through training, drills, and the hiring of a School Security Officer, we are committed to providing a secure and nurturing environment where all students can thrive.

Fight Flu

Influenza (flu), spreads easily and can make people very sick, especially kids. You can help stop flu!

Flu symptoms include:

Fever or chills, body aches, cough, sore throat, headache, runny or stuffy nose, feeling very tired. Some people, especially children, may have stomach problems and diarrhea. Unlike a cold, the flu comes on very suddenly.

Prevent flu!

- Flu vaccine is the best protection against the flu. It is recommended every year for everyone 6 months and older.
- Get the flu vaccine for you and your children every year! It helps make flu sickness milder or prevents it altogether.
- Getting the vaccine early in the fall means you and your children will be protected when flu season starts.
- Make sure people close to your children, like babysitters and relatives, are also vaccinated.
- The vaccine is especially important for people with certain medical conditions like asthma, diabetes, and heart or lung disease, because the flu can make them even sicker.

If your child gets the flu:

- · Your child will need plenty of rest and lots of fluids.
- Keep your child home from school for at least 24 hours after their fever is gone without using fever-control medicine. This helps avoid giving the flu to others.
- Talk with your child's health care provider before giving a child any over-the-counter medicine.
- Never give your child or teenager aspirin or any medicine that has aspirin in it. Aspirin can cause serious problems for children and teens.
- Young children and those with certain medical conditions, like asthma, diabetes, and heart or lung disease, are at greater risk for getting seriously ill from the flu.
- If your child gets flu symptoms and is younger than 5 or has a medical condition, call their health care provider and ask about antiviral treatment.
- If you are worried about your child, call their health care provider.

Don't spread flu!

- Wash hands often with soap and water for at least 20 seconds.
- If soap and water aren't handy, use an alcohol-based hand rub.
- Cough or sneeze into a tissue or your elbow, not your hands. Put used tissues in the trash.
- · Avoid touching your eyes, nose, and mouth. That's how germs spread.
- · Stay away from people who are sick.

CELL PHONE POLICY

Below is a reminder of our cell phone policy, which was reviewed with students during the first week of school:

Per our student handbook and Code of Conduct, students in grades 5-8 are allowed to have their cell phones and electronic devices such as ear buds or wireless headphones, during breakfast and after school. Students in grades 9-12 are allowed to have their phones during breakfast, lunch, and after school. During regular school hours, cell phones and electronic devices should be kept in their locker.

Per the handbook and Code of Conduct, if a phone or device is taken away and it is a first offense, it will be kept in the office until the end of the following school day, detention assigned, and parent contact made. For a second offense, the device will be held in the office for two school days, not including the day it was taken away, two detentions assigned, and parent contact made. On a third offense, the phone or device will be held in the office for five days, not including the day it was taken, in school suspension will be assigned, and the parent will be notified and required to pick the phone up.

If there are additional infractions beyond a third offense, the students may receive out of school suspension or be required to attend a Superintendent's Hearing.
