## **News From the Superintendent:** *By Mrs. Jennifer Cappelletti*

Greeting Scio Families,

We will be having an early release day on Monday, April 8. I have been anxiously anticipating this day for several years! Our community is almost in the path of totality for the total solar eclipse



happening that afternoon. If it is a clear day,

the view from Scio will be an amazing one but a short drive in Allegany County will take you to locations that will experience full totality. Please see the chart on this page for locations in Allegany County.

Over the next few weeks, students will be learning more about the science behind the eclipse including hands-on activities in the elementary STEM classes. We will be sending home family packs of information prior to the eclipse that will include a few pairs of glasses. We are thankful to Allegany County for providing a portion of our glasses. The early release will ensure that no student is on the bus during the event as this is happening in our area around 3:20 p.m. We hope that families will be able to enjoy this event together.

## Why be Excited About this Eclipse?

The excitement over the eclipse stems from the view that can be seen and how rare we get to view it. There will not be another total solar eclipse in New York State until May 1, 2079, and there will not be another total solar eclipse in our immediate area until October 26, 2144.

During a Total Solar Eclipse, even though the sun is much larger than the moon, the two bodies are at just the right distances to make them appear to be the same size in our sky and the moon passes directly in front of the sun. When this happens, a beautiful ring of light appears, the stars are visible in the middle of the day, birds stop chirping because they think it is nighttime, and people experience a few minutes of eerie darkness -"totality"- in the middle of the day.

## Viewing the Eclipse Safely

Using caution when viewing the eclipse is essential. The only safe way to view the partially or uneclipsed sun is through specialized solar filters, like those found in eclipse glasses or handheld solar viewers. The only exception to this is during totality. For that brief period, it is safe to view the eclipse with your naked eye. Scio will not experience totality making it unsafe to view with the naked eye at all. For more information on viewing solar eclipses safely, visit https:// science.nasa.gov/eclipses/ safety/.

# Eclipse Safety Precuations

 View the sun through eclipse glasses or a handheld solar viewer during the partial eclipse phases before and after totality. If they are torn, scratched, or otherwise damaged, throw them away.

 DO NOT look at the sun through a camera lens, telescope, binoculars, or any other optical device while wearing eclipse glasses or using a handheld solar viewer. The concentrated solar rays will burn through the filter and cause serious eye injury.

 You can view the eclipse directly without proper eye protection only when the Moon completely obscures the sun's bright face – during the brief and spectacular period known as totality. (You'll know it's safe when you can no longer see any part of the sun through eclipse glasses or a solar viewer.)

 As soon as you see even a little bit of the bright sun reappear after totality, immediately put your eclipse glasses back on.

# **Home-Schooled Notice**

I would like to take this opportunity to notify all parents of students with disabilities who are in home instruction programs pursuant to section 100.10 of the Regulations of the Commissioner of Education that:

- For home-schooled students who are students with disabilities, the Committee on Special Education (CSE) would develop an individualized education services program (IESP) for the student. The IESP would be developed in the same manner and have the same contents as an individualized education program (IEP). An IESP is developed in consideration of the parents' decision to home school their child.
- In order to receive services in the 2024-25 school year, **a parent must submit a written request for such services to the Board of Education no later than June 1 of this year.** For a student who is first identified as a student with a disability after the first day of June 2024 and prior to the first day of April of 2025, a parent must submit the written request for services <u>within 30 days</u> after the student is first identified. A request may also be submitted within 30 days of a change in the student's school district of residence.

As per School Board policy, parents of out-of-district students must request permission in writing for their child to attend Scio Central School every year. Letters of request to attend Scio Central School for the 2024-25 school year must be submitted to the Superintendent of Schools no later than April 30.

## Home-instructed students

Parents who home instruct their children must submit quarterly reports for your children. Annual assessments must be filed with fourth-quarter reports. Parents of students who intend to educate their children at home must provide a written notice to the superintendent annually by July 1 of each school year.

The Board of Education of every school district must locate and identify all children with disabilities from birth to 21 years of age who reside in the school district. If you live in the Scio School District and you suspect that your son or daughter (birth through 21 years of age) may have a disability that negatively impacts his or her education, please contact Kelly Morehouse, Director of Pupil Personnel Services, at (585) 593-5510, ext. 1140 to learn more about the special education referral process. We offer special education services and related services for all children with disabilities who are homeless or wards of the state, and children with disabilities attending private schools, regardless of the severity of their disability.

## PRE-KINDERGARTEN:

If you live in the Scio Central School District and you have a child whose *fourth* birthday falls on or before December 1, 2024, your child is eligible to enter Pre-Kindergarten in the fall of 2024.

Please note: Pre-Kindergarten enrollment is limited. If enrollment prior to March 29th exceeds the number of seats, a lottery will determine those to be enrolled.

## KINDERGARTEN:

If you live in the Scio Central School District and you have a child whose <u>fifth</u> birthday falls on or before December 1, 2024, your child is eligible to enter Kindergarten in the fall of 2024.
