

News From the Superintendent:

As I am writing this message at the end of June, my mind is focused on the reopening of school. At this point, there are more questions than answers, and I am sure you have some of the same questions I do. *What will school look like? Will we be in school, remote learning or a combination of these? How will we make sure students, faculty and staff are safe? What are the strategies we will use to make up for lost learning? What will transportation look like? Will people be comfortable coming to school?* The questions can go on and on.

Rest assured, we will be working to make plans for school in September. The reality is that we have to look at multiple possibilities. We miss being together. We know that if we can be in the building, it will need to look different, but being together is important. This experience has confirmed that when we are together, more learning occurs. The connection teachers build with students greatly enhances the learning process and that connection is better when it is (made) in person. We have also confirmed that many important things happen in a school building that have nothing to do with academics. Our teachers did a commendable job working to connect with students and families. They were asked to do the impossible almost overnight and they put on their hero capes and rose to the challenge. Scio teachers confirmed for us that they care about academics and the overall well-being of their students.



We learned a lot from our remote learning experience. We also need to hear from you ... so we know what worked well, and what you would like to see work differently. I would like to thank the community for showing their support through our school budget vote. We had almost five times as many voters than last year and the budget approval rate was 75%. We thank you for standing with us and supporting our school. I also want to thank our district clerk, Mrs. Cathy Law. She ordered envelopes, collected addresses and got over a thousand ballots out within a very short period of time. She saw the process through by organizing the counting of the ballots and tabulating the results. Thank you, Mrs. Law!

In this issue, you will find many pictures from graduation. It was certainly a different commencement day, but I am so grateful our students were able to be together at one ceremony. Thank you to all who were able to attend. It was wonderful to see your loved ones "walk the stage." No Summer Driver Education



Health Exam Update

2020-2021 New York State law requires a health examination for all students entering the school district for the first time, when entering Pre-K, K, 1st, 3rd, 5th, 7th, 9th and 11th grade as well as any student participating in modified, junior varsity, or varsity sports during any school calendar year.

The health examination must be completed by a New York State licensed physician, physician assistant or nurse practitioner. A letter was mailed home in May to all grade levels as well as any potential athletes in grades 7-12 for the 2020-2021 school year. Please continue to follow the recommendations in the letter to schedule a physical with your child/children's health care provider.

Due to Covid-19 Executive Order for school closure this past school year, all sports physicals that were scheduled in the spring were canceled. On May 21, 2020 an updated memo was released by NYSED regarding health examinations for student athletes for the 2020-2021 school year. All students participating in sports will still be required to obtain a health examination to participate. Student athletes are permitted to start the fall 2020 sports season if they have previously had a health examination for school attendance in the 2018-2019 or 2019-2020 school year along with an updated health history signed by a parent/guardian within 30 days of the start of the season. Student athletes who have not previously had a health examination must still obtain one prior to the fall 2020 sports season.

ALL student athletes MUST obtain a new physical exam prior to the winter sports season for 2020-2021 starting on November 16, 2020.

ALL grade level physicals for Pre-K, K, 1st, 3rd, 5th, 7th, 9th and 11th MUST BE COMPLETED within 30 days from the start of the 2020-2021 school year.

Requested physicals may be mailed or faxed to the school health office at (585) 593-0704.

In 1989, I left a private school of similar school size to teach business at Scio Central (School). I could not tell the difference between the schools except one had tuition and uniforms and Scio did not. I point that out because for over 30 years I have said I teach at a publicly funded private school -- Scio Central! No school is perfect, but I think Scio is the 'cat's meow.' The teachers care so much (about the students). you could say it is an extension of the community's family. Our school board members gave and give their time and efforts freely with little appreciation, but with big results! The local Lion's Club has always had the school's back . . . and the community -- well, they might complain occasionally about this or that, but heaven forbid if anybody else speaks ill of the school!

I think back to the many wonderful administrators we have had over the years, and I am grateful. I thank Mr. Pavlock -- given the name "Sir" by students out of respect -- who as technology coordinator, always managed to keep us far ahead of other schools, which greatly benefited our students.

In my time at Scio, I have taught grades 4-12 plus college credit courses and adult education. I enjoyed them all. The curriculum changed every year, but I was especially proud of the Economics and Government students, who passed a three-day cumulative final to graduate. They truly understood America's modified Free Enterprise System, the value of work, ethics, the opportunity cost of their choices and more. For 25 of those 31 years, I had 12-14 different classes to prepare for each day, which any teacher would say is going the extra mile to the extreme -- but then, I was not alone. Nearly all the Scio teachers and coaches went just as far beyond the call of duty or more to help our students succeed. I challenge the new crop of teachers and administrators to do the same and as near as I can tell -- they are rising to the occasion ... and that is part of what makes Scio Central School so great!

I am extremely proud of the Future Business Leaders of America FBLA Club, which for 30 years managed the Spirit of Christmas Toy Program so well and sent CARE packages to active duty SCS Alumni. Of course, I also enjoyed the monthly donut meetings. A special thank you to all the wonderful FBLA club presidents and officers for never dropping the ball! I am proud of the SCS website and the entire business program.

Congratulations to the Class of 2020. You may not have had a traditional March to June "end of year" experience, but you did escape "senioritis" and have the honor of going where no class before you ever did. Although I am sure you would have preferred a prom, a spring season in sports, and those last three months with a normal graduation. I wish you all the best in your future.

I also invite all SCS alumni to visit me at my second career as a seasonal gentleman farmer/vintner to share how you are doing.

In closing, thank you to my colleagues, past and present; the students, the community and most of all -- the alumni for a great 31 years. It went by so fast!
